President's Speech at 50th Anniversary by Cindy Stewart

Firstly before I begin I would like to thank Richard Szczepanski and Graham Watson for agreeing to research much of the history of what we know today as Gimli New Horizons 55+ Activity Centre. They spoke to Vic & Muriel Savage and Pauline Finlay who were able to provide information and documents to them and they poured through documents, newsletters and various files. They also spoke to Nancy Dudar who helped to organize the first meeting and her Mother who was part of the original group. Richard has chosen not to speak today so I am doing it in his stead. I too have gone through old Board minutes, newsletters and other various files and what a wealth of information.

Graham and I will be speaking and hope to keep it to a reasonable time frame. I am going to start and have made a few notes (ROLL OUT PAPER) seriously though. Gimli New Horizons as it became known as, was 1 woman's dream her name was MARY KRULICKI. Some of this is taken from the first minutes and a report dated January 20, 1975 (I was in Grade 12 at the time). Mary had met a member of the Fisher Branch New Horizons Club and told her about a grant that was available thru the Health and Welfare Branch of the Federal Government; The New Horizons program which enables retired people to create projects of their own choosing to benefit themselves and others in the community. The project covered an 18 month period and at the end of that time the program should be fully launched and be self supporting.

The essentials of the program were 1) participation and 2) Outreach; that is to get new members especially those living alone. In November 1973 Mary asked Adeline Pawulski, to help organize a meeting. Adeline then asked 3 others to help: Helen Krulicki, Nancy Dudar, and Connie Havard. They helped with donations from Gimli Merchants (we all know food and prizes get people to meetings). The meeting was to be held December 8,1973 at the Provincial Recreation Training Centre. However, imagine the disappointment when the weather on December 8 did not cooperate and the meeting had to be cancelled because the roads were sheets of ice. Mary didn't give up though and set a new meeting date of February 14,1974 at the same location. Even though that day was bitterly cold 67 people came out. They sat around the open fireplace, eating goodies (Sound familiar). After they moved to another room, Mr. Voth from the Gimli Health Unit explained the program (this program is still around today giving out grants). That night the first Executive came to be:

Mary Krulicki- President Dr. Frank Scribner- Vice President Joey Thordason- Secretary Helgi Johnson – Treasurer Margaret Strand- Assistant Treasurer

June 10, 1974 the cheque for \$10,705.00 arrives from New Horizons. The next step was where to meet? The Landmark Apartments were fine for meetings but what about starting activities? They inspected the old school but it was deemed unsafe and set for demolition. The K & K store (located kitty corner to where the Library is now) was too small. They had been in talks with the town of Gimli. On August 27, 1974 the following resolution was passed by the Council for the Town of Gimli: "Resolved that the agreement of the Gimli Yacht Club, that the group of the New Horizons be given the use of the multi-purpose addition to the Club premises, for a rental fee of \$100/ month for 9 months of the year (October- June)"

The official opening was October 25, 1974 with a Wine & Cheese party. Close to 200 people attended and they picked out the oldest 2 ladies and they held the ribbon when the Mayor Violet Einarson cut the ribbon. Just a quick note to end- The Fisher Branch group was called the "Elderly People Club". Thank goodness we didn't follow in those footsteps.

The History of GNH Property and Buildings by Graham Watson

The following is a general outline of Gimli New Horizons' evolving history. It should be noted that the historical documents available contain somewhat contradictory information. From now on, the Centre will be referred to as GNH.

In prior centuries, the land on which GNH now stands was part of Indigenous territories.

This land has quite a varied history. In 1876, Jonas Dalman immigrated from Iceland, followed by Rosa Marteinsdottir, who came from the same region. They became the 57th couple to be issued a marriage license under the place name of Winnipeg. Later on, in 1912, the Dalman family, who were long established dairy farmers in Winnipeg, purchased and moved to a 10-acre farm north of what was then the town limits of Gimli, where they farmed for seven years. GNH is now located on land that was part of their farm.

Around 1920, One Big Union, a major labour union at the time, bought the farmland to create a summer camp, known to this day as the OBU Camp. The camp was made up of 12 seasonal cabins and other support buildings, including a kitchen and hall that were actively used for some 20 years. As you drive out of GNH's parking lot, you'll see a sign on the right dedicated to the OBU Camp.

The province bought the OBU Camp around 1939 on behalf of the Department of Education to start summer training courses for teachers to achieve their permanent teacher certificates. They would occupy the cabins for the entire month of July, followed by 4-H Clubs and others in August.

Twenty-six years later, in 1965, many buildings were winterized and the facilities became known as the Gimli Provincial Recreation Centre, intended to promote arts and craft courses for Manitobans. As a result, many arts and crafts clubs sprung up across the province – including Gimli.

The Centre was used for conferences, sports clinics and training youth leadership and playground directors. For example, the Manitoba Women's Institute held a biannual fall leadership "live-in" at the Centre and the Blue Bombers football club held its spring training camp there for two years.

Founded in 1974, GNH had used various buildings around Gimli over the years. The most significant was the Gimli Yacht Club, which the organization was able to access in the winter. An ongoing search for a building to rent or to buy that would meet the varied needs and the size of the growing membership was launched, but to no avail. GNH then began to view what was then called the Gimli Training Centre as a promising property. By late 1993, efforts were directed to the Manitoba Government Cabinet for GNH to lease the Training Centre's main buildings.

In 1994, GNH members toured the main buildings, some of the cabins and other parts of the Centre. That same day, the membership voted to sign a 20-year lease for a New Club House and subsequently signed it with the province. New Horizons moved its office and indoor activities to this location shortly afterwards. In early 1997, the province appears to have carried out considerable maintenance and repair of the buildings. Later, in 1997, it transferred ownership of a number of properties to the R.M. of Gimli, one of which is the current location of GNH. Shortly afterwards, the RM of Gimli and GNH replaced the 20-year lease with a 99-year lease. From 1997 through 2002, significant maintenance was completed and permanently shifting cabins were moved to become part of the main building or adjacent to it.

Presently, the RM of Gimli retains the ownership of the property and buildings, providing grading and snow clearing of the parking lot and grass cutting. The RM also offers grants from time to time (e.g., it made a major contribution to the recent replacement of roofing). In turn, GNH maintains the buildings (often applying for grants for major repair projects) and pays for insurance, utilities and other operating costs. Proceeds from Bingo pay for most of the utilities. Finally, East Interlake Health Authority provides a quarterly stipend that reimburses most of the office salaries. As you can see, "It takes a village to" keep our senior community club running. Thank you for all the support.

How Did They Do It? by Graham Watson

The first issue of Hilites, GNH's monthly bulletin, appeared in April 1996. From that time forward, it has provided a detailed history of the organization's activities and endeavours. I reviewed the Hilites Newsletter in detail from the first issue until GNH hired its first employed office personnel in 2001.

Hilites was the brainchild of board member John Van Loon, who provided stewardship over the early years. At the time of the first issue, GNH boasted 200 members who paid a yearly membership fee of \$10, plus a compulsory \$5 name tag. Hilites started out as a small, thin, black and white monthly bulletin. In 2000, black and white photos and advertising via business cards were introduced. By January 2001, membership had dramatically climbed to 427.

Many of the fund-raising means and member activities are similar to those we have today. Unique activities included day bus excursions including a picnic, Spanish lessons, ice curling, darts and ceramics. There were also choral and square-dancing groups and a band, which all performed for other organizations. By the end of this time period, GNH was known in the local community for its Valentine's Social, St. Patrick's Casino, Spring Tea, perogies sales, Icelandic Pancake Breakfast, Christmas Craft and Bake Sale and Christmas Dinner and Dance. Hearing, health and foot clinics were also offered. Indoor smoking was allowed until January 1999.

Early on in this period, GNH was not open full time during the working week. A call for volunteers was launched to serve as "hosts" and be present Monday to Friday from 10 am to 4 pm. In July 1999, the facility was open for the first time during the entire working week. A vice-president was assigned to keep track of all the exterior door keys needed. Can you imagine running such a large organization without any employed staff? Volunteers manned the office to take telephone calls, track membership, take registrations for special events, keep the books, and do banking. Volunteers were also needed to assemble editions of Hilites: print the side of one page, reinsert it to print the other side, and then fold, assemble and staple them. Since there was no cleaning staff, volunteers cleaned the buildings on weekends.

Some things have clearly not changed. For instance, there have always been ongoing complaints about the gravel parking lot and some events were cancelled because of inadequate registration before a necessary deadline. Although volunteers were readily appreciated in the Hilites, calls were regularly launched for more volunteers. All sound familiar?

Hilites no longer acknowledges birthdays and expressions of sympathy due to governmental requirements about confidentiality. By about the year 2000, only one office computer had an internet connection, which was intermittent, and the computer ran on DOS rather than Windows. GNH got an email address just before the association began hiring its first employed personnel.

So that folks is how the membership ran GNH back at the turn of the century.

HISTORY OF GIMLI NEW HORIZONS

1974

The New Horizons grant we received from the Health & Welfare branch of the Federal Government was \$10,705.00.

The board started looking for a suitable site to hold meetings: the old school was looked at but deemed unsafe. K & K store was also looked at but was too small.

Made an agreement with Gimli Yacht Club to rent for 9 months (Oct - June) of the each year during their off season.

1975

Prime Minister of Iceland and his wife visit The Gimli New Horizons along with the Ambassador to Iceland.

1976

Membership reaches 200 people.

1989

The clubhouse at the Yacht Club is no longer meeting our needs. Started to look around, possibilities are the old arena site to build new clubhouse, 2 properties side by side: lots 93 & 95 on 3rd Ave. Cost is \$40,100.00.

Incorporation status was added so the Centre could issue tax receipts.

1990

Our first Pancake breakfast was run by volunteer members and held at The Icelandic Festival Building.

1994

In May; 90 members go through the Gimli Training Centre to look at that property owned by the Provincial Government. 97 people attended the meeting after the viewing and a vote was taken to lease the property and the cabins. Vote was 88 in favour, 11 opposed (Membership was 190) A lease was signed on May 17, 1994 that was a 20 year lease starting on June 1, 1994.

1995

Moved into our current building.

1996

John Van Loon starts the first newsletter called "Hilites".

1997

A new lease was signed in August with the R.M of Gimli that was for 99 years.

2001

The Tree Of Life designed and painted by Jacqueline Goodman. First Fall supper was held. First paid office staff hired.

2002

Name the Room contest was held: Grand Room, Card Yard, Coffee Spot & Harmony Room

2007

New Mission Statement reads "The Centre will be an asset to the community a pleasant place for recreation, relaxation and companionship and by encouraging all members to remain active and socially connected while maintaining their physical and mental health".

2009

Became a designated staging area for the Emergency Measures Organization.

2019

Because the new Gimli Senior Residence was being constructed on south parking lot, a new entrance on the north side was required.

2020 - 2021

We had to close the Centre due to COVID for the better part of 12 months.

2024

50th Anniversary Celebration was held on May 8th with 170 New Horizon Members and invited guests.
